## PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear League Members:

We had a good planning session last month. As a result of that meeting, we are in the process of inviting speakers for the following three events. We will also hold a consensus meeting on the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) agriculture study and proposed position on this subject in early March.

- ε **Sunday, February 23, 3:00 - 4:30 p.m. "Our Food: Who, What, How, and Why?" at the Falls Church City Community Center.** A discussion of how agricultural policies and procedures affect our daily lives. Speakers include Forrest Pritchard, family farmer, public speaker and author of *Gaining Ground, A Story of Farmers' Markets, Local Food, and Saving the Family Farm*; Bill Garvelink, ambassador (ret), senior adviser for Global Strategy for International Medical Corps, and initiator of "Feed the Future, the President's Global Food Security Initiative"; Elaine Apter, a member of the League of Women Voters of Montgomery County, Maryland's agriculture committee; and Chris McMaugh, manager, The Local Market, Falls Church City. This session will help prepare our League for the consensus session on LWVUS's agriculture study and recommended position (see article below).

- ε **Sunday, March 23, 3:00 - 4:30 p.m. "Falls Church City's Tomorrow: Maximizing Our New Resources"** at the Falls Church City Community Center, Senior Center. A panel of local and regional experts will discuss possible uses for the land Falls Church City acquired from Fairfax in the recent water system sale. Topics will include city and regional demographics, sustainable environmental development, and other issues that need to be considered to ensure that Falls Church remains a thriving and effective city over the next

⌘ **LWVUS AGRICULTURE POSITION UPDATE**  
**STUDY:**  
**Consensus 2014**

The League of Women Voters was founded by Carrie Chapman Catt in 1920, just six months before the 19th amendment to the US Constitution was ratified, giving women the right to vote after a 72-year struggle. From the beginning, the League has been an activist, grassroots organization whose founders believed that citizens should play a critical role in advocacy.

Studies are part of League Program and, in League parlance, League Program includes all of the positions the League uses to affect public policy as well as the procedure for adopting these programs. Program is such an integral part of the League that, according to League basics, "Program is the League's reason for being." Positions are how the League executes the often quoted statement: *Democracy is not a spectator sport!*

Agriculture touches everyone's life and is a major part of the US economy. Because Ag policies are so far-reaching, it is important that the League of Women Voters be able to advocate on specific issues.

The 2012 biennial convention of the League of Women Voters voted to conduct a study to update the League's existing Agriculture position. The Agriculture Update is focused narrowly on: 1) current technology issues in agriculture, including genetically modified organisms (GMOs), herbicides, pesticides, agriculture water pollution, aquifer depletion, antibiotics in livestock, and accurate food labeling; and 2) current agriculture finance issues, including consolidation in agriculture industries, crop subsidies, and the federal agricultural regulatory process.

The result of the Ag Update is five pages of Consensus questions that encompass 1) the Economic Health of the Agricultural Sector, 2) Animal Management, 3) Research & Development, 4) Food Safety, and 5) Food Labeling. The Study Committee has provided more than 25 background papers. The LWVUS has provided a number of related recommended readings, which can be found [here](#).

The League of Women Voters of Cincinnati prepared one particularly helpful document, which keys the consensus questions directly to the suggested readings and research pages.
